# EMPLOYMENT RELATIONS (FLEXIBLE WORKING) ACT 2023

Implementation April 2024

A greater entitlement to request a change to:

- The number of hours worked each week
- Start and finish times
- To request home working.
- These will be day one entitlements.



Regardless of whatever appears in a Job Advertisement, Job Offer letter or Contract of Employment, a new Employee can submit a request from their first day in a job.



The Act also includes an opportunity for workers to submit two requests in a rolling twelve month period.



Any request made by an Employee will have to be subject to a 2/3 week consultation process.

Currently a line manager only needs to meet with an Employer to discuss their request.



# Reasons for refusal:

- Additional cost to the Council.
- Damage to Parishioner service.
- Inability to share work out amongst other staff.
- Damage to quality of work.
- Damage to performance.
- Inability to recruit staff to cover reduced hours.

If, following a period of consultation and a meaningful assessment of the evidence, it can be proven that one or more of the above apply, the request can be rejected.



# **HOLIDAY PAY**

Councils can add a holiday pay increment of 12.07% to Employees' pay, rather than pay holiday pay when they take time off.

# Where would this work?

Locums

Fixed Term staff

Zero hours staff

Part time (short hours) Clerk.



# For Example

Employee earns £100/week
Holiday pay (@ 12.07%) = £12.07
Total Pay £112.07



No pay when they take leave

No payment in lieu when they leave



# NJC Entitlement:

$$23 + 8 + 2 = 33/5 = 6.6$$
 weeks

52 - 6.6 = 45.4 weeks to be worked in a year.

$$6.6 / 45.4 = 0.1450$$

The percentage is 14.50% NOT 12.07%

# CARERS LEAVE ENTITLEMENT

# **Implementation April 2024**

- Employees who have caring responsibilities can request up to 1 weeks unpaid leave in a 12 month period.
- This entitlement has no qualifying period and will be available from day one of employment.



# Requests can be made for:

- The whole week in one go
  - 1, 2, 3 days
    - Half days



Councils can refuse specific dates due to business reason.

But must provide a mutually agreed date within one month of the original request.



- Failure by Councils to facilitate these requests would be a breach of statutory rights and could result in claims for Unfair/Constructive Dismissal.
  - As this is a day one entitlement, such claims could be made without two years continuous service.



# **NEW PATERNITY LEAVE REGULATIONS**

New dads can take two week paternity leave entitlement as two separate one week blocks (rather than having to take just one week in total or two consecutive weeks)



This can be taken any time in the 52 weeks after birth (rather than having to take leave in the 56 days following birth)



28 days notice required to take paternity leave (Previously 15 weeks notice required before the Expected Week of Childbirth (EWC))

# WORKERS (PREDICTABLE TERMS AND CONDITIONS) ACT 2023

Anyone with 26 weeks continuous service who is engaged on a zero hours contract, or fixed term contract, will be able to request:

- 1. Regular hours.
- 2. Regular Days.
- 3. If they are engaged on a fixed term contract of 12 months or less, they can request that the contract be extended for a longer period or made permanent.



The worker must submit their request in writing. Reasons for rejection.

- 1. Additional Costs.
- 2. Potential damage to Parishioner service.
- 3. Detrimental impact on recruiting staff.
- 4. Detrimental effects on other aspects of the Council.
- 5. Lack of work.



The Employee can Appeal.

If unsuccessful the Employee can make a claim to an Employment Tribunal based on the Council's failure to prove that their reasons.

#### **BRIEFING ON COUNCIL EMAIL ADDRESSES**

More and more council business is being conducted online, and this means that all council staff should be aware of, and follow, best practice email use and management. This describes the importance of using official, council email accounts and offers practical guidance on email security.

#### The importance of using official email addresses

We strongly advocate for using official email addresses for council work. NALC, SLCC, the Cabinet Office and the Information Commissioner's Office (ICO) recommend using an official .gov.uk email. In the ICO factsheet for councils, it states that 'councils must process data securely - which may be more difficult to achieve if it is being processed through personal email accounts.' There are some very important reasons for using official, rather than personal, email addresses:

- Official correspondence should reflect the professionalism of the council. An official email address enhances the credibility of the sender and the council itself. Using official government branding creates trust and makes it easier for residents to identify official communications.
- If official communications are always sent through council-sanctioned channels then council staff can be sure that records are kept, and decisions are documented for public scrutiny.
- Council email accounts facilitate the creation and maintenance of official records. This is crucial for the proper functioning of the council, for auditing purposes, transparency, and accountability. It helps track decisions, discussions, and other important communications.
- By separating your personal life from your professional life, you ensure members of the public, partners and suppliers understand you are emailing them in your role as a clerk or councillor. Recipients will be clear about who the email is from and the capacity it is being sent.
- An official email address ensures there is no confusion about the legitimacy of communications. They are less likely to be sent to spam or blocked, and more likely to be read and responded to quickly.
- If a subject access or freedom of information request is made then all emails to and from that account pertaining to that request may need to be reviewed and / or released. If using a personal email account, this can be a complex and invasive process. Using an official account both protects your personal information and makes managing such a request straightforward.

More detailed guidance on <u>data protection</u> and <u>freedom of information</u> can be found in the members' area of the NALC website.

Changes in council staff are easier to manage with an official email address.
 Compliance with the council's legal obligations around data control are more straightforward; information can be retained or archived appropriately. The clerk is able to complete administrative tasks, such as accessing historic emails / data, before closure. There will be no confusion for residents and ex-staff members will not accidentally receive council related emails.

#### Good practice password management and email security

To comply with privacy and data protection rules, council staff must operate their email account in a secure way. Here is some key advice on keeping your email account secure:

- Do not share your password with anyone else or write it down where other people can find it.
- Use <u>the National Cyber Security Centre's guidance</u> to help you choose a secure password.
- Use multi-factor authentication (MFA). This means providing additional information on an occasional basis but provides the best security. You can find more on MFA here.
- Make sure your computer is password protected and that it automatically locks if you are away from it for more than 5-10 minutes. You can also lock it manually: usually this is by pressing CTRL + ALT + DELETE at the same time on Windows devices.
- Do not routinely redirect council emails automatically from one account to another.
- Educate yourself there are a number of online courses via Nimble eLearning, such as basic cyber security, password management and phishing. Register through your county association or NALC.
- Make sure other staff (where these exist), or the chair, know the process and who to contact in an emergency, such as a sudden absence. This is best achieved through contacting the IT/email provider and arranging for an out-of-office, with alternative contact details to be added to the inaccessible account, or by forwarding emails to someone else for a very limited period. As a precaution, you should not store crucial information that colleagues may need within your email system.

#### 1. Parish Liaison Overview

All Council services liaise and engage with the Parish Sector as part of their usual business operations. Through recent restructures Parish Sector Support is also provided through Democratic Services and in the Parish Liaison, Local Devolution and Community Rights Team within Localities. The two teams work together to support the approach and implementation of arrangements in relation to Parish Sector consultation and liaison.

In Democratic Services there are three Democratic Services Area Teams based on the Area Committee Boundaries and within each of these Teams there is a lead Democratic Services Officer supporting Parish Councils and maintaining information held on the website, they are also the first point of contact for any day-to-day enquiries from Parish Clerks. There is also a Local Area Support Team which oversees the work, supporting the Parish Sector and linked infrastructure organisations to assist with Parish and Town Council complaints and standards issues and associated training. They help make connections with the local element of council democracy such as Area Committees, Community Partnerships and individual members.

In Localities a new Parish Liaison, Local Devolution and Community Rights Team has been created to work with the Parish Sector to develop and implement the Parish Charter, support Parish consultation and liaison/information exchange/relevant communications and provide an initial North Yorkshire Council 'front door' for the Parish Sector including the development of a portal to support the relationship. The team also support the devolution of assets/services to the Parish Sector and community organisations and manages the Council's statutory responsibilities in relation to Assets of Community Value and Community Right to Challenge.

Information will be shared on a regular basis about Parish Liaison developments, initiatives and opportunities.

# 2. Boundary Commission Parish Sector Briefing – Thursday 29 August at 7pm

The Local Government Boundary Commission for England (LGBCE) is due to begin an electoral review of North Yorkshire Council.

The LGBCE is a parliamentary body established by statute to conduct boundary, electoral and structural reviews of local government areas in England. The Commission is independent of government and political parties and is directly accountable to the Speaker's Committee of the House of Commons. An electoral review examines and proposes new electoral arrangements for the whole local authority. These are:

- The total number of councillors that should be elected to the local authority in the future: (called the 'council size')
- The total number of divisions, division boundaries, names and the number of councillors to represent each division.

As such, the review is likely to have implications for North Yorkshire Council and its constituent parishes. The new electoral arrangements will come into effect at an allout election which will take place at the next county elections in 2027.

To broaden your knowledge of the review, the LGBCE has agreed to undertake a briefing which is open to all parishes and community groups across North Yorkshire. The briefing will take place at 7pm on Thursday 29 August remotely through Microsoft Teams.

# 4. Home Upgrade Grants (Free Energy Efficiency Improvements) - Ending soon

The Home upgrade grants scheme is **coming to an end on 13 September 2024**, the leaflet attached to this e-mail provides further information, the main details are below:

- The Home Upgrade Grant offers free home upgrades to households in North Yorkshire to help lower energy bills.
- The council can offer fully funded installations of energy efficient upgrades such as loft or wall insulation, solar panels or heat pumps.
- Houses must not be heated by mains gas and have a gross household income of £36k (or below), or someone in the household receives a means tested benefit
- Householders on the scheme have saved up to £610 on their bills with the upgrades
- The scheme is managed by YES Energy Solutions on behalf of North Yorkshire Council

# Are you eligible?

To qualify for a Home Upgrade Grant you must be a homeowner or private renter and:

- Your home must not be heated by mains gas and its Energy Performance Certificate (EPC) rating must be D or below and;
- Have a gross household income below £36,000 or
- Someone in the household claims a means tested benefit.
- \* Unlike homeowners, private landlords must contribute towards installation costs.

  The funding is only available if the tenant qualifies and the landlord owns 4 or less properties



If you live in an eligible postcode, your house only needs to be rated D and below and not heated by mains gas to qualify. The YES team can help advise.

# **Start saving energy**





On the 6 June 1944, Allied Forces launched the invasion of German-occupied western Europe, one of the greatest operations of all time - the D-Day Normandy landings. Allied fighter pilots patrolled the perimeters establishing an aerial 'umbrella' and bombers cratered local enemy airfields, in addition to the continued bombardment of rail and road centres. While maintaining air superiority, fighter pilots were able to exploit their situation, flying armed reconnaissance in the battle area, firing rockets, dropping bombs, and unleashing their machine guns, contributing massively to the liberation of western Europe. What is often forgotten is that over 3,500 RAF personnel played key roles in the war efforts in western Europe as the significant deeds in the air and RAF personnel supported operations from the ground, including the construction of airfields, servicing aircraft and providing a forward air control function.

Since then, the Royal Air Force has continued to be ever vigilant, identifying and responding to threats that could affect us and our families, but they are also ready to prevent conflict and ready to deliver urgent assistance that is needed here in the UK or around the world. In 2022 alone, more than 7,250 people were deployed in 75 countries and directly supported 41 operations across five continents and the Falkland Islands.

Along with the other Services, on 6 June 2024, the Royal Air Force will be participating in the lighting of the beacons to mark the 80th anniversary of D-Day and pay tribute to those who made the ultimate sacrifice. Not only will we be remembering the brave men and women who played their part in the Second World War, we will also take a moment of reflection to acknowledge the current and future support and commitment from the RAF community, including serving personnel and their families, veterans, Air Training Corps, and reservists.




The 6th June 2024 marks the 80th anniversary of D-Day, when Allied forces mounted the largest amphibious invasion the world has ever witnessed. In 1944 Operation Overlord saw around 4,000 ships and landing craft set down about 132,500 troops on five Normandy beaches in an action that would bring about the liberation of north-west Europe from Nazi occupation.

The bravery and sacrifice of those people in securing the peace and freedom we enjoy today will be observed by the lighting of beacons around the United Kingdom, Channel Islands, Isle of Man and UK Overseas Territories. I hope your community will join us.

We are asking villages, towns, cities and organisations of all sizes to mark the 80th anniversary of D-Day by lighting a beacon at **9.15pm** on 6th June 2024, in celebration of the 'light of peace' that emerged out of the darkness of war, followed by an event to commemorate one of the most momentous achievements in living memory. Your event could be devoted to raising valuable funds for The Royal Naval Association, ABF The Soldiers' Charity, The Royal Air Force Benevolent Fund and The Merchant Navy Association. You will find details of how to participate on **pages 53 and 54** of this guide.

It is our country's opportunity to remember over 209,000 Allied casualties of Operation Overlord. This includes nearly 37,000 ground forces and 16,714 air forces killed in the invasion of Normandy's Utah, Omaha, Gold, Juno and Sword beaches, and the long and bloody campaign that followed. We plan to light beacons on all five beaches to remember those who died or came home wounded.

The statistics behind the successful operation, which eventually convinced the Nazi high command that their defeat was inevitable, are both shocking and awe inspiring. German defence forces were drawn away from Normandy by distraction tactics as resources were secretly built up on the English coast.

Nine million tonnes of supplies and equipment were shipped across the Atlantic and 1.4 million American servicemen arrived to

join a substantial contingent of Canadian forces. By 1944 over two million troops from 12 countries were in Britain preparing for the invasion. On D-Day, American, British and Canadian troops were augmented by personnel from Australia, Belgium, Czechoslovakia, the Netherlands, France, Greece, New Zealand, Norway, Rhodesia and Poland. Soon after midnight on 6th June, more than 180,000 Allied paratroopers were dropped into the invasion area, and Allied air crews flew 14,674 sorties to support the landings.

Operation Neptune, the naval phase of the campaign, saw nearly 7,000 vessels, including battleships, destroyers, minesweepers and assault craft, escorting and landing the ground troops on the beaches and bombarding German coastal defences.

There were approximately 156,000 Allied troops that landed in Normandy by sea and air on D-Day, of whom around 130,000 landed on the beaches, so you might be surprised to learn that despite the extraordinary courage displayed by so many on 6th June 1944, just one Victoria Cross was awarded. It went to Company Sergeant Major Stanley Hollis of the 6th Battalion, The Green Howards, who landed on Gold Beach. Durina an intense day of fighting, Stan Hollis took two enemy pillboxes and a field gun and crew, capturing 30 Germans single-handedly. The citation for the Yorkshireman's VC, presented by King George VI, says: "It was largely

through his heroism and resource that the Company's objectives were gained and casualties were not heavier, and by his own bravery he saved the lives of many of his men."

Already battle-hardened at the age of 31, Stan should have been one of the most famous soldiers of WW2 but was a naturally modest man and after the war worked in a number of trades before becoming a publican.

His earliest job, however, was working in his father's fish and chip shop in Robin Hood's Bay. Fittingly, fish and chips will play a major part in the

Thanks to the generous support and involvement of National Fish and Chip Day and the National Federation of Fish Friers, many thousands of fish and chip shops around the United Kingdom will take part in the day's activities. Schools, pubs, hotels and restaurants etc, are also encouraged to get involved by serving up this great British tradition in tribute to those who gave so much, and to raise valuable funds for the four charities involved.

The international 80th Anniversary Beacon will be lit at 9.15pm on His Majesty's Naval Base, Portsmouth, Hampshire, and will represent those that sacrificed so much during the landing on the five Beaches in Normandy, as well as the many thousands that supported them in the air, on land and at sea. However, there will be many organisations in our local communities such as pubs, hotels, restaurants, hospitals, fish and chip shops and other locations throughout the United Kingdom, Cap badge of the Yorkshire Regiment.



Channel Islands, Isle of Man and UK Overseas Territories, that would like to take part but are unable to have a Beacon, the flame from which represents the 'light of peace' that emerged from the dreadful darkness of war. We therefore encourage them to light the Lamp Light of Peace at that time, ensuring they feel part of this important anniversary. See page 40 for details.

As the Beacons and Lamps are lit, we would ask all those taking part to stop what they are doing and undertake **The International Tribute**, using the wording found on page 41. This could be undertaken by your Lord Mayor, Mayor, High Steward, Town and Parish Clerk, Town Crier, Pub Landlord or even a young person from one of your local youth organisations etc, paying their tribute to those who gave so much to enable us to enjoy the many years of peace and freedom we have enjoyed since the Second World War. Pubs up and down the country will be marking this moment too, involving their customers.

D-Day was a monumental campaign to rid Europe of Nazi horror, and the 80th anniversary of this remarkable operation deserves the recognition and gratitude of our country. Please ioin us on 6th June 2024 to commemorate the sacrifices made by so many in our name.

# Women who played key roles during D-Day

Women played key roles in D-Day, the Allied assault on Nazi-held France that is the largest amphibious invasion in history.

People tend to think women were just secretarial couriers and messengers. No, there were female special forces agents on the ground and working to keep the Allies from being blown back into the water.



Sister Mollie Evershed.

Among those who lost their lives during D-Day and the Battle of Normandy are two women, both nurses, 27-year-old **Sister Mollie Evershed** and **Sister Dorothy Anyta Field**, 32.

Sister Evershed was on a Hospital Carrier ship, the Amsterdam, treating casualties from Juno Beach when the ship hit a mine.

As it sank, she and another nurse went below decks and carried 75

men to safety, helping them into a waiting lifeboat. But she and her fellow nurse went down with the ship.

She was posthumously mentioned in dispatches and awarded the King's Commendation for Brave Conduct.

In addition to the men who took part in that invasion, many women — including Women Airforce Service Pilots — also risked their lives on June 6, 1944. Women also played pivotal roles in war efforts throughout history, assuming the roles of nurses, spies, code breakers, journalists and so much more.



Lise de Baissac.

37-year-old **Lise de Baissac**, the daughter of a wealthy family in British-ruled Mauritius, was in France when Hitler's troops moved into Paris in 1940. She fled to the south and then to London. When the SOE started recruiting multilingual women as agents, she joined the fight.

After parachuting into Central France, de Baissac set up an Allied safe house for agents in the town of Poitiers in western France, selecting an apartment near Gestapo headquarters - a hiding-in-plain-sight strategy

she felt would arouse less suspicion.

She bicycled around occupied territory as a liaison among different underground networks, often riding 60-70 kilometres a day and carrying contraband. On one occasion, a Nazi stopped her and her clandestine radio operator, patting them down. The officer searched them for guns, which they didn't have, so he let them go. She'd later report that a radio crystal fell out of her skirt as she was leaving but that she leaned over, grabbed the crystal off the ground, and pedalled on.

In August of 1943, when her network in Poitiers was blown, the SOE airlifted her back to England by Lysander aircraft. She trained new female SOE recruits in Scotland. In April of 1944, after recovering from a broken leg, she jumped back into occupied France. She made her way to Normandy, joining her brother, fellow SOE agent Claude de Baissac, in leading a network of Resistance fighters in Normandy. They carried out attacks to weaken Nazi communication and transportation circuits, strategically cutting phone lines and blowing up roads, railways, and bridges to hinder the movement of German reinforcements Hitler was ordering to the beaches.

On June 5, 1944, de Baissac was in Paris recruiting when she learned D-Day was imminent. She biked for three days, speeding through Nazi formations, sleeping in ditches, and reaching her brother and their Resistance circuit headquarters in Normandy.

As the bloody Normandy campaign raged and the Allies struggled to penetrate the Axis front, the de Baissacs continued leading espionage and sabotage operations. They gathered intelligence on enemy positions and transmitted messages back to England, helping lay the groundwork for Operation Cobra, the Allied breakout in which U.S. Army forces came out of the peninsula and pierced Hitler's front line seven weeks after D-Day.

After the war, she worked for the BBC.



Martha Gellhorn.

Martha Gellhorn was not ready to bow out.

On the night of June 5, 1944, before the ships departed for Normandy, Gellhorn made her way to the waterfront on the pretext of interviewing the nurses aboard a hospital ship. Once on board, she hid herself in the bathroom. Gellhorn knew that if she got caught, she would lose her accreditation

and might even get deported back to America. Still, to witness the great invasion was worth the risk. Gellhorn remained in her hideout for several hours and only emerged when the ship was well on her way to France. Later that night, after the troops had landed and the massacre on the beach was finally over, Gellhorn sneaked ashore with a couple of doctors and medics as a stretcher bearer to collect the wounded. In the chaos of the war, nobody gave a damn that Gellhorn was a woman.

Children's Pre-School and Nursery School first established in 1864



During the Blitz there were 7,736 children killed by enemy actions. A further 7,672 were recorded as being seriously injured, with many of them being orphaned and others losing brothers and sisters.

Over 1.5 million evacuees, or 'unattended children' as they were called at the time, were transported from towns and cities to the countryside.

D-Day or Operation Neptune was the largest amphibious invasion in the history of warfare and could not have been achieved unless victory had been achieved in the Battle of the Atlantic in May 1943.

The children listened to the poem written by Roy Palmer Herald and Chelsea Pensioner, The Royal Hospital, Chelsea, and would like to encourage every school of all ages in the country to take part in this unique 'tribute' to the many thousands of children killed by enemy action and over 1.5 million evacuees, or 'unattended children', at 11am on 6th June 2024.

They all made their own union flags, and the poem could be read out by the form teacher, or a pupil.

The children will also be served fish and chips with mushy peas for lunch that day, as they want to support the fishermen who fished the seas avoiding the mines and the German submarines, along with the men and women who farmed the fields to keep the nation fed, not knowing if their loved ones would return.

## D-Day 80's Tribute to Scottish Piper William (Bill) Millin



Step into the extraordinary tale of heroism that unfolded amidst the thunderous chaos of D-Day. Among the valiant British troops who descended upon Sword Beach, there emerged a figure whose unwavering spirit embodied the very essence of awe-inspiring

courage. Bill Millin, a mere 21 years of age, stood alone amidst the tempest, adorned in the ancient garb of a Scottish piper, chosen by none other than Lord Lovat himself to wield the power of music in the face of devastation.

It was an audacious act, for the war's stringent regulations

forbade pipers from venturing onto the front lines. Yet, as the echoes of combat reverberated through the air, Millin fearlessly defied convention. When he reminded Lord Lovat of this transgression, the gallant lord, in his resolute Scottish manner, responded, "Ah, but that's the English War Office. You and I are both Scottish, and that doesn't apply."

At the break of dawn, around 07:25, the great invasion began. Among the early waves, Lord Lovat's craft crashed upon the shore, accompanied by the haunting melody of Millin's bagpipes. With unyielding determination, our piper led the brigade ashore in Queen Red Sector, his music echoing across the hallowed grounds. Through a hailstorm of bullets and the heart-wrenching descent of fallen comrades, he strode, his tunes weaving a tapestry of courage and defiance. "Road to the Isles" and "Highland Laddie" danced on the wind, inspiring those who fought alongside him to press forward with unwavering resolve.

Now, we invite you to witness a recreation of that historic scene as our 21 year old piper Alex Smith

retraces the footsteps of 21 year old piper Millin, embarking on a journey that spans 10 kilometres from Sword Beach to Pegasus Bridge, passing through the poignant landscapes of Colleville-

British 1st Special Service Brigade D-Day 6th June 1944 Montgomery and Saint Aubin d'Arquenay - the initial objective of the valiant 4 Commandos.

Once the bridge has been crossed, "Blue Bonnets" shall fill the air, a testament to the indomitable spirit that resided within the heart of a lone piper.

Moreover, as night descends, the resonant sound of bagpipes shall grace the capital cities of the United Kingdom - London, Edinburgh, Belfast, and Cardiff - at 9:10 pm, just before the beacons ignite, symbolising the unity and indelible bond forged on that fateful day. Across the nations involved in the D-Day landings, the capital cities shall resound with the soul-stirring melodies of bagpipes at 9.10 pm.

We will also have a presence in the capital cities of the allied nations that took part in this operation. From Washington DC to the distant shores of New Zealand's Auckland, from Ottawa to Paris, and from Canberra to Brussels, Athens and Amsterdam, Oslo, Warsaw and Prague, at 9.10 pm local time the timeless power of the pipes shall intertwine with the eternal memory of the brave souls who fought for freedom.

## A Fisherman's Tale

#### by The National Federation of Fisherman's Organisations

11 months of hard fighting and sacrifice still lay ahead before the fall of Berlin in May 1945, but D-Day, on 6th June 1944, marked the beginning of the liberation of Europe from Nazi tyranny. Fishermen played multiple roles in holding off the aggressors and in the final defeat of fascism in Europe. Skilled seamen in their own right, many fishers fought directly in the Royal Navy and other services in multiple theatres of war. Famously, trawlers and their crews were requisitioned and adapted to minesweeping and coastal patrol functions, defending our coasts until the fight could be taken to the enemy. Many fishing vessels from the continent escaped as the Nazis advanced, to continue fishing from ports like Fleetwood in the Irish Sea, helping to break the U-boat blockade

and its attempt to starve Britain into submission. The Shetland Bus, run on fishing vessels, was an essential escape route, then a key element in the Resistance in Norway.

Famously, fishing vessels were prominent amongst the flotilla of small boats which helped embark the embattled army from the beaches of Dunkirk, allowing Britain's survival as a fighting force and ability to return on D-Day to begin the liberation.

We, in the fishing industry, would like to add our voice to those who mark this pivotal day in world history and salute all who made the ultimate sacrifice to ensure our freedoms and urge all those taking part in the 80th anniversary commemorations on 6th June 2024, to serve up and eat Fish and Chips with Mushy Peas on board ship that evening, along with lighting a ships lantern at 9.15pm. This will coincide with the lighting of the beacons throughout the United Kingdom, Channel Islands, Isle of Man, UK Overseas Territories and on the five beaches in Normandy, France, in celebration of the 'light of peace that emerged from the darkness of war'. We will use this historic occasion to pay tribute to the brave fisherman that fished the dangerous seas during the difficult time of war, having to leave loved ones at home, to keep the nation fed. (We also ask those taking part to sound their ships horn at 9.15pm).

In 1942 she was requisitioned by the Ministry of War Transport and became engaged in salvage work. In 1966 she was transferred to the Marine Services Division of The Royal Navy where she was fitted with a new boiler.

It is only fitting therefore, that she should play this unique maritime role in D-Day 80, enabling her crew and those guests on board to pay their 'tribute' to those brave seaman who fished the dangerous seas and assisted in the D-Day landings, constantly having to dodge the mines and the German Submarines eighty years ago on 6th June 2024.

## Country Women Countrywide 'dig up' the Nation's favourite



What a privilege it was when Bruno Peek, Pageantmaster of D-Day 80 invited Country Women Countrywide to design a menu to accompany the national lighting of beacons event for D-Day 80. It was

an added honour that we were also asked to relate our suggestion to the memory of the only serviceman to receive the esteemed Victoria Cross for his heroic actions on 6 June 1944 – D-Day. Our brief required us to create a simple readily accessible menu to include quintessentially British food.

It was clear that some research into the background of this brave, yet modest, soldier would be necessary and we could never have guessed where the information gained would lead us. It would indeed take us to a simple, yet hugely significant, solution.

'Our soldier' Company Sergeant Major (CSM) Stanley Hollis VC had served in The Green Howards throughout WW2. Looking at his background prior to joining the army it was revealed that Stanley had assisted his father in the family's fish and chip shop in Robin Hood's Bay, in Yorkshire. Would this be our first clue? Where to next?

We all took on board this connection and following contact with the President of the Federation of Fish Friers discovered another interesting fact. 'FISH' and 'CHIPS' had played a significant role in ensuring the safety of our troops whilst on foreign soil. When a soldier was aware of others in the vicinity but unaware of whether they were friend or foe he called out 'FISH'. If the response was 'CHIPS' he could be pretty certain that this unseen person was a 'friend'. If no response was received then it would be highly likely that there was a 'foe' nearby and extreme caution was essential.

So, should we be taking the connection with fish and chips more seriously? There was clearly resonance with our soldier, Stanley.

The next fact to emerge was that during both the World Wars fish and chips was considered so key to maintaining the morale of the nation that, unlike meat, cheese, eggs and other sources of protein, fish was never rationed. During WW2, the Government of the day, led of course by Winston Churchill, was committed to safeguarding the accessibility of fish and chips because the nation needed it to maintain spirits. It was Winston Churchill himself that couched the phrase 'The Good Companions' to refer to fish and chips, further highlighting its importance to the nation's morale.

However, whilst the main ingredient – the fish – was not rationed, it was expensive which rendered it out of reach financially for many and it would not have been economically possible to live on fish and chips. Whilst we can accept that the waters around our island would not be the safest place to be during WW2 it was also the case that many fishing boats particularly trawlers were requisitioned, along with their crew, for war service not least during the evacuation of Dunkirk in 1940. This left a smaller fishing fleet often run by the wives of the now serving fishermen; those wives would have in the past been engaged in making and repairing nets and gutting the fish once landed. Now they were fishermen as well. This reduced

fishing activity and the inevitably limited safe waters in which to fish reduced the catch and had the knock on effect of increasing the price. Even if a family could afford fish and chips it was likely that a single portion would be shared between parents and a number of children. It was even more likely that a portion or two of much cheaper mushy peas would be purchased to stretch the meal further.

And so, our journey has led us to identify, not a menu, but a single dish to link 'our soldier' to the beacon lightings across the land - and clearly that dish must be 'fish and chips' – potentially with the added and equally traditional mushy peas which helped to bulk up a meal for a very hungry population during the times of rationing.

Given that the beginnings of our organisation date back to 1948, under the name of Farm Women's Club, it is fitting that Country Women Countrywide was invited to become involved in this historic event. Some of our older members will have first-hand memories of growing up in the war years, possibly 'digging up spuds' or harvesting peas. For others it would have been their mothers, aunts and grandmothers who were working the land at a time when many of the menfolk were away at war – and possibly did not return.

And now there is a challenge for all of us. Fish and chips has been decided upon in honour of CSM Stanley Hollis VC and brave and decorated though he was, he was just one soldier. There were approximately 156,000 Allied troops that landed in Normandy by sea and air on D-Day, of whom around 130,00 landed on the beaches, so wouldn't it be a fitting tribute if we could honour their bravery by consuming a total of least 156,000 portions of fish and chips (and mushy peas) on 6th June 2024.



# The National Independent Lifeboat Association "Remembers" with the D-Day 80 Lamp Light of Peace

The National Independent Lifeboat Association is proud to be taking part in the Lamp Light of Peace, an integral part of the D-Day 80 commemorations/celebrations on 6th June 2024.

Lifeboat crews from 2 stations in Kent took part in Operation Dynamo saving over 3400 lives with the rest of the fleet of little ships and other lifeboats

around the south coast continued to provide assistance to ships in the Channel during the war.

During 1944 alone there were 455 Lifeboat launches 280 of these were to vessels or aircraft in distress due to enemy attack or other related war causes and 931 lives were saved by shore boats (excluding the D-Day landings).

The National Independent Lifeboat Association was set up as a way of giving the 40+ independent lifeboats across the United Kingdom and the Channel Islands a single voice at national level feeding in to the UK Search and Rescue Operators framework and with Government. We are looking to raise awareness of independent lifeboats with the national public perception that all lifeboats belong to the RNLI which is not the case.

Independent Lifeboats are set up for a number of reasons but mostly due to the local need for a lifeboat and all the crews are highly skilled and confident to deal with any situation that may arise and train continuously to keep these skills up to date.

We will be encouraging all our 36 member Lifeboats throughout the United Kingdom, Channel Islands and the Isle of Man to purchase and light their Lamp Light of Peace, which represents the 'light of peace' that emerged from the dreadful darkness of war, at 9.15pm on 6th June 2024, coinciding with the lighting of the Beacons that night, enabling the crews to use this unique

opportunity to pay 'tribute' to all the brave Lifeboat men that still had to man and undertake life saving duties along with other activities in support of the war effort all those years ago, as well as those at home who had to patiently wait for their return.

## Families everywhere can Remember their Loved Ones with the D-Day 80 Lamp Light of Peace

My mother Jean Marshall (then Jean Herring) was a Land Army girl based at Home Farm, Clopton, Suffolk. She was awarded the British Empire Medal for helping to rescue the crew from a burning bomber plane. Below is her account of the incident at the age of 92.

16th April 1942. I was on the bus, with airmen sitting opposite me, going back to Home Farm, where I worked during the war, and a bomber plane heavily loaded was taking off on the runway alongside the bus. We could tell the plane was not flying high enough to clear some trees on our right. It turned right over the road and crash-landed in a meadow. The driver stopped the bus. He and I dashed out and ran across the road into the meadow and to the left where there was smoke and fire. I struggled through a thorny hedge and there was the plane flopped on the grass with no landing gear. The door was open so I could see inside, the navigator was first right. My thought was to get the pilot out first as he was face down on his controls and they seemed to be red hot. I put both my arms around him and dragged him out backwards - what a weight he was! I heaved him onto the grass and struggled to take off his mask thinking he would suffocate but to no avail - I didn't know what to do - and then a voice said "It's alright love - we're here now." It was an airman in uniform and he picked up my shoulderbaa for me.

I tried to work the next day but couldn't, my hands were too blistered.

Jean Herring received the British Empire Medal from King George VI for her gallantry.

My Uncle, Eric Myhill, went to Norwich to enlist, prepared to follow in his father's footsteps in the Army (Ypres, Somme). On that day, only Royal Navy positions were being issued and he was given the option to "feed us or shoot them" - he preferred cooking meals to being a gunner and shooting people, so a cook he became. Family members, including my cousin Mark Ratcliff, have a collective impression of Eric's experiences of the D-Day landings based on his rare conversations plus gathered facts. We believe Eric served on the landing craft LC(T) 923. His mission to carry Universal (Bren Gun) Carriers to the beaches began with his Commanding Officer next to him becoming caught in cables used on the front ramps, consequently losing his arm. When they ran to the beach they became stranded on underwater obstacles as the tide ebbed and they were stuck under enemy fire until the tide turned and able to refloat - "We were stuck high and dry on concrete being shot at."


LC(T) 923 had been allocated to 55th LCT Flotilla, "U" LCT Squadron for the D-Day assault, scheduled to land at  $H+3\frac{1}{2}$  hours on 6 June. Records show that it was carrying 73 men from 2 Essex and 2 Gloucestershire Regiments, HQ and signal staff of 56 Brigade and 26 Regimental Combat Team (US Army).

The intended landing point was Gold Beach Sector Jig Green East, sited close to Asnelles.

The vehicles carried were:

- 3 x 5cwt 4x4
- 8 x Universal Carriers
- 6 x Universal Carriers armed with mortar
- 7 x Motorcycles
- 1 x M14 Half Track
- 1 x Handcart
- 1 x Scout Car

Let us remember those who gave their lives at home and abroad during the D-Day landings, whose sacrifice enables us all to enjoy the peace and freedom we have today.

Let us remember those who came home wounded, physically and mentally, and the friends and family who cared for them.

Let us remember those who returned to restore their relationships and rebuild their working lives after years of conflict and turmoil.

Let us remember the families that lost husbands, wives, sons, daughters and sweethearts.

Let us remember the servicemen and women and merchant seafarers of all nationalities - from all countries - who fought, suffered and died during the D-Day landings and six years of war.

Let us all remember those in the Royal Navy,
Army, Royal Air Force, Merchant Navy, and our
Allies - the brave people who kept us safe on
the home front and abroad and those in
reserved occupations during the difficult time of war.

Let us remember the brave doctors and nurses who cared for the wounded, the men and women who toiled in the fields, the coal mines, the factories and the air raid wardens, police officers, firemen, ambulance drivers and the young people of the Scouts and Guides who all played such a vital role in the war.



## **Bonfire Beacon**

Locate the bonfire at least 60m away from buildings, roads, railways and public rights of way, and a safe distance from dangerous materials and overhead power lines. Ensure it has good access for the transportation of materials for the bonfire and sufficient space for spectators to stand upwind.

Obtain the landowner's permission and involvement

Liaise with your local fire brigade and all emergency services in your area, presenting them with your plans, and seek their advice and support.

Prepare site by removing top layer of turf and stack away from fire area. Obtain seven poles, 5-6m in length. Attach four guy ropes to top of one pole and anchor as shown.

Erect remaining poles as shown, ensuring tops are secured in place.

Use either pallets or suitable lengths of timber, spreading them over ground area of beacon for a good through draught. Secure timber horizontally between poles as shown, preventing material placed over the framework from dropping through. Construct access tunnel to the middle of the beacon. Keep middle empty until required. Always construct the bonfire so it collapses inwards as it burns.

4 Use only wood for combustible materials.
Do not burn dangerous items such as foam-filled furniture, old tyres, aerosols or tins of paint. Build upwards until height of centre pole is reached. Materials around top should be loosely packed to allow air flow. Cover bonfire to keep it dry.

Fill centre with suitable, dry combustible materials. Check construction is stable and remove any unsuitable materials that may have been added. Look specifically for fireworks, aerosols, highly inflammable materials or containers with such materials.

Construct a safety barrier out of ropes and stakes or scaffold poles to ensure public is kept at a safe distance from the fire.

In daylight, and for several hours, and up to lighting, check that there are no children or animals, such as hedgehogs etc playing or hiding in or round the bonfire. Arrange for at least 12 marshals to be in attendance, and undertake a sufficient safety briefing before lighting the beacon.

The person looking after the fire should not wear lightweight clothing that could


ignite easily. They should wear a substantial outer garment of wool, or other material of low flammability, and stout boots. They should know what to do in the event of a burn injury, or a person's clothing catching fire, and should have a fire blanket ready in the bonfire area along with a number of fire extinguishers.


O Lighting: the safest and recommended approach is to use paper and solid firelighters in six places just inside the walls of the beacon to ensure an even burn. Never use flammable liquids such as paraffin or petrol to get it going as this can result in uncontrolled spread of fire or explosion.



## Your D-Day 80 Bishops Frome Strawman

#### Ideal for Farms, Stately Homes and Country Landowners

#### How to Build your Strawman Beacon

This type of Beacon is ideal for farms, stately homes and our country landowners, using it a as fun aspect to celebrate/commemorate and pay tribute to the many that gave their lives unconditionally. It could be a public event or just for family, friends and those that work so hard on the land but in a similar way during WII to keep the Nation fed during those difficult times when many of the men of the land were out defending our country overseas, never to return.

Obtain the landowners's permission and involvement then ensure you locate your Bishops Frome Strawman at least 60m away from buildings, roads, railways and public rights of way, and a safe distance from dangerous materials and overhead power lines. Ensure it has good access for the transportation of materials for the bonfire and sufficient space for spectators to stand upwind.

Liaise with your local fire brigade and all emergency services in your area, presenting them with your plans, and seek their advice and support. In the event of dry weather, high winds and a heightened wildfire risk on the day of the event, please carefully consider scaling back initial plans where appropriate.

Prepare site by removing top layer of turf and stack away from fire area.

2 Use only wood and straw for combustible materials and wrap steel banding around them all to hold the bales together

while burning to stop them from falling away. Please dispose of the bands responsibly after the event.

3 Construct a safety barrier out of ropes and stakes or scaffold poles to ensure public is kept at a safe distance from the fire.

In daylight, and for several hours, and up to lighting, check that there are no children or animals playing or hiding in or round the Strawman. Arrange for at least 12 marshals to be in attendance, and undertake a sufficient safety briefing before lighting the Strawman.

The person looking after the fire should not wear lightweight clothing that could ignite easily. They should wear a substantial outer garment of wool, or other material of low flammability, and stout boots. They should know what to do in the event of a burn injury, or a person's clothing catching fire, and should have a fire blanket ready in the Strawman area along with a number of fire extinguishers.

Lighting: the safest and recommended approach is to use paper and solid firelighters in six places just inside the walls of the Bishops Frome Strawman to ensure an even burn. Never use flammable liquids such as paraffin or petrol to get it going as this can result in uncontrolled spread of fire or explosion.

7 To light the Strawman: from poles 2m in length, prepare hand torches for lighting with paraffin-soaked rags wired around one

end. Remember, paraffin is dangerous and great care should be taken. Paraffin can be used as directed, but it is still dangerous and should at all times be treated with great care - for example, always ensure all excess paraffin is drained off rags before use. If spilt on your clothes during the preparation of your Strawman lighting you should replace those items of clothing before approaching any naked flames. In particular, always remember to replace the lid on any container of unused paraffin and store it in a safe place away from naked flames. Do not use an accelerant on the fire itself.





## **Beacon Brazier**





#### **Materials Required for Beacon Construction**

Wooden centre post consisting of 305mm x 305mm wooden post, 6.25 metres in length of which 2 metres goes into the ground.

Basket and fixing brackets consisting of:

- 1 x 920mm diameter steel plate.
- 1 x 4,178mm long 60mm x 5mm steel flat bar rolled into 1,330mm diameter ring.
- 1 x 3,455mm long 60mm x 5mm steel flat bar rolled into 1,100mm diameter ring.
- 1 x 2,985mm long 60mm x 5mm steel flat bar rolled into 950mm diameter ring.
- 1 x 2,922mm long 150mm x 5mm steel flat bar rolled into 930mm diameter ring.
- 12 x (approx 1,250mm long) 60mm x 5mm vertical bars (rolled to shape).
- 1 x 310mm x 310mm x 300mm high connection box welded to base of basket.
- 1 x hanging shield and support: 3.7m length of 38mm diameter solid steel rod.
- 1 x 920mm x 760mm steel plate 3mm thick 4 x connection brackets 8mm thick
- 1 x 920mm x /60mm steel plate 3mm thick 4 x connection brackets 8mm thick (see detailed drawings left).
- 2 x pins and loops.

## Gas-Fuelled Beacon

#### **Bullfinch Gas Equipment**

The beacon's burner-head is in the shape of a globe, surrounded by a D-Day 80 banner. It is of lightweight construction and comes assembled and complete, with the exception of the gas cylinders, which must be purchased separately. 2 x 19kg full cylinders of propane are recommended to give a full flame for a good three

quarters of an hour. If you wish for less than this then one 19kg cylinder or 2 x 13kg cylinders should be sufficient. These should be full or nearly full.

These cylinders can be purchased from good lp gas (propane and butane) stockists and dealers. Do order early to ensure you can get availability.

The Gas Torch needed to light your beacon safely requires a 400g cylinder of propane with CGA600 fitting - Bullfinch No 1644 or Rothenberger or equivalent. Travis Perkins, Screwfix, Plumb Centres and some DIY stores should have these as stock items, or you can purchase from us.

## The D-Day 80 Gas-Fuelled Beacon Package contains:

- Burner unit with D-Day 80 insignia
- 2m high stand
- Ground anchor and rope for fixing the stand to the ground
- 10m hose with the regulator for connecting to the gas
- Gas torch for lighting
- Spanner
- Leak detecting fluid
- Hose assembly and Y manifold to link 2 cylinders
- Lighting and safety instructions

The above items are packed into 2 strong cartons. The tripod describes a circle area of about 1.32m diameter and the beacon has an extended height of about 2.15m.


We have made many different beacons over the years. The flames are very stable in winds and the structures are also

wind stable. The beacon is supplied with a ground anchor and rope for securing to the ground if this is possible, or we would recommend the use of sandbags. Full instructions are provided for this. The beacon must be supervised by two people at all times when lit and a fire extinguisher must always be available. It is important that supervision should be undertaken by those who are competent and it is essential that a lighting trial takes place before the event to ensure that everyone is fully trained and familiar with the operation.

The price of a gasfuelled D-Day 80 Beacon is £549 plus VAT, including carriage to your door within UK mainland (Highlands and Islands excluded). There will be an extra charge for other



The beacon will burn for approximately 1 hour using two 13kg standard propane gas cylinders, which are available from most gas stockists and petrol stations around the UK. The gas assembly is easily connected to the burner by a quick release fitting. The beacon is inherently stable; however, we recommend the use of anchors on soft ground or sandbags on hard ground for additional stability. Full set-up instructions are included within the pack and we recommend a trial set-up and lighting before the actual event to familiarise yourself with the set-up and operation. There has been no greater combined air, sea and land operation in the history of warfare than Operation Overlord codename for the invasion of Normandy.

The seaborne element of the invasion - Operation Neptune - required 6,833 vessels from great battleships pounding German defences, down to small floating galleys, salvage tugs and landing craft. The naval force was crewed by Frenchmen, Norwegians, Dutch, Poles, Greeks, Americans, but especially Britons and Canadians, who accounted for nearly 80 per cent of all the sailors taking part.

The Royal Marines played a vital part too. Of the hundreds of landing craft sent against the beaches of Normandy, Royal Marines.

With ever diminishing numbers of Naval veterans who survived this areat victory, it is vital that we pay tribute to those who died on this great endeavour, are no longer with us or are not well enough to attend in person.

#### Public or private event & legal essentials

Ensure you have undertaken all the legal essentials and safety requirements on **page 54** before lighting your Beacon and Lamp. Alert the emergency services, including the Fire Brigade, undertake any risk assessments required and ensure everyone involved is happy and familiar with your plans. (This is your responsibility as coordinator). In the event of dry weather, high winds and a heightened wildfire risk on the day of the event, please carefully consider scaling back initial plans where appropriate.

### Beacon and Lamp Light lighting ceremony - 6th June 2024

Please light your Beacon and Lamp and undertake the Nation's Tribute using the wording found on page 41 at 9.15pm.

The Beacon and Lamp Light, lighting ceremony and the Nation's Tribute should be undertaken as follows:

**Step 2:** Invite your Lord Lieutenant, DL, Lord Mayor, Sheriff, High Steward, Lord Provost, Chairman of Leader of the Council, winner of your competition, or another of your choice from within your local community etc, to light your Beacon or Lamp and undertake the Nation's Tribute at **9.15pm**, using the wording found on **page 41**. Alternatively, you may wish to organise a competition in partnership with your local media, with the winner having the honour of lighting the Beacon or Lamp and the Nation's Toast.

**Step 3:** If appropriate, use social media channels - Twitter, Facebook etc - to promote your event. On Facebook, post photographs of your beacon lighting ceremony.


**Step 4:** Publicise your event. We will provide you with a Press Release template which you can localise, providing as much information as you wish regarding your event, but including your contact details. You can send this to your local media to enable them to get in touch with you direct.













Above and background: The Tower of London built by William the Conqueror in the early 1080s. Through the centuries, successive monarchs have added to the fortifications.

If you are inviting personal guests to your home it is worth checking with your household insurer that you are covered in the unfortunate circumstances that there should be an accident. If your event includes inviting the public, or it is a third party venue then, where applicable, the following advice should be heeded, to ensure you have a safe and enjoyable event for everyone involved.

#### Licensing

Generally, all public entertainment has to be licensed by the local authority. The law on this aims to ensure the safety of the public and performers. Local authorities treat each event individually, and what one will allow another will not. Do not be put off by the length of some of the forms - the licensing officer is there to help you.

The licensing officer's job is to advise the local authority's licensing committee on the granting of public entertainment licenses. For small scale events he or she, in effect, makes the decision. Only if your event is contentious will the licensing committee decide to consider the application in detail. Talk to the licensing officer as soon as possible. In Northern Ireland, if you plan to sell alcohol at an event, you will need to apply for an occasional liquor license from the Northern Ireland Court Service.

#### Insurance

Unfortunately, accidents can happen at even the best organised events. Therefore, you will need to consider and obtain insurance cover for your event, whether you are holding an event on your own premises or someone else's. beacon/bonfire events require specialist public liability cover. If you hire a park or venue or use land owned by a third party for your activity, they are likely to require you to have your own suitable insurance to cover your liability for any injury to the public or damage to other people's land or property.

## Legal Essentials and Safety (This is your responsibility)

If hiring equipment for the event, you may need to insure these items; you may also need to consider cover for loss of any financial outlay you incur if the event has to be cancelled for reasons beyond your control, or loss of money, particularly if you are holding a fund-raising event. Therefore, to help you obtain the appropriate insurance, and risk management advice, we are working closely with Unity Insurance Services, which is a specialist insurance broker in the voluntary and non-profit sector.

They have developed a range of bespoke insurance covers specifically for the Beacon/Bonfire events. Unity is owned by a charity and donates all its profits back to charity, so to obtain a quote or for more details or advice on the insurance cover



Alternatively, the licensing officer may be able to direct you to a suitable specialist company or broker, but you should not try to source this kind of insurance from a non-specialist.

#### **Emergency Services**

Tell your local Fire and Rescue Service and Police Force well in advance about the type of event you are planning, and get in touch with your local community police officer. Ensure that access for emergency services is maintained for your event. Write to the local fire brigade and ambulance service, particularly if you are planning to have a beacon/bonfire, fireworks, or an event that will attract a large crowd. St John's Ambulance and the British Red Cross will provide first aid and sometimes a vehicle. In some areas they are simply happy to receive a donation. In others, expect a fee to be charged.

#### **Food and Drink**

Basic food hygiene guidelines should be followed at all times if you are providing food and drink. Caterers must have food hygiene certificates. Advice on this subject can be obtained from your local council environmental officer.

#### Alcohol

If you want to sell alcohol you will need to secure a licence. From February 2005, licenses are granted by the local authority rather than the Magistrates Court. You should therefore contact your local authority licensing section and seek information from them on how to apply. During 2005 all existing licenses have to be renewed and this will inevitably lead to long lead-in-times. Please apply as early as possible.

#### Site Clearance

The local authority will arrange for clearance and disposal of litter after your event if it is on public ground (check for possible charges). You can help this process by arranging litter bins or recycling bins around the site, and a crew to clear up throughout the event.

#### **Hiring or Borrowing Equipment**

Your local authorities, or local event organisers may be able to help you with contacts for supplies such as marquees, portable toilets, barriers and bunting, or may in some cases have these for you to hire and borrow. You may also need to consider generators, a public address system, and emergency flood lighting. If you need to arrange insurance for your hired equipment, Unity Insurance Services can arrange this for you too.

#### **All Ability Access**

Access for people with a disability is very important. Many local authorities run community transport schemes. Talk to them about arranging transport. On greenfield sites, access may be improved by cutting the grass before the event.

#### **Legal Essentials and Safety**

This aspect of your event is your total responsibility, so please ensure you have undertaken all the necessary risk assessments and respective insurance etc, to reflect this.

The sacrifice and dedication of all those involved in D-Day can never be underestimated.

As Healthwatch Norfolk, we also want to acknowledge the efforts of those in the medical and caring professions who did so much to help those injured in the huge air, sea, and land operation.

The doctors, nurses, orderlies and their teams were the hidden heroes and heroines of this huge operation.

Often soldiers had been transported for several days to wards in this country with burns, fractures, and disfiguring injuries.

As well as the surgery and treatment, these healthcare staff provided care, reassurance and emotional support to those who had gone through so much to serve their country.

We would ask people to remember these caring, dedicated and passionate people alongside the many who gave so much on D-Day to help the liberation of Europe.



#### Welcome and introduction

This guide is aimed at Parish Councils to provide you with all the information you need to start your move to a .gov.uk domain. It is produced by the Parish Council Domains Helper Service, a part of the Cabinet Office.

Our service is divided into two simple stages to:

- 1. Equip you with the knowledge and resources for your council to begin its move to a .gov.uk domain
- 2. Provide support and guidance on how to check, test and plan the launch of your new .gov.uk domain (once it has been set up) and how to maintain best working practices for the future.

A separate guide is available to help with the second of these stages. You will receive this after you attend the next session.

#### **Checklist**

This checklist shows the simple steps your council needs to work through to move successfully to a .gov.uk domain:

Understand the benefits of a .gov.uk domain - credibility, admin and cyber
security
Get council approval to proceed
Identify your council's needs (for example, domain, website, email)
Set your council's budget
Decide on your council's .gov.uk domain name
Choose a registrant (formerly called a domain name administrator)
Understand the enhanced support from the .gov.uk Approved Registrars
Prepare questions for the .gov.uk Approved Registrars
Get 3 from the shortlist of .gov.uk Approved Registrars
Select the best .gov.uk Approved Registrar for your council
Appoint your chosen .gov.uk Approved Registrar to start the application process

## Benefits of a .gov.uk domain

This section describes why moving to a .gov.uk domain is important. Use the key points in discussion with your council so they understand the benefits and can make an informed decision about moving to a .gov.uk domain.

#### **Working online**

The majority of business and communications are now done online. It is quicker, more efficient, less costly and more sustainable. You can now reach your communities instantly through your websites and emails. Your communities also expect your council information to be available, and accessible, at the click of a mouse.

#### Credibility

Your community will expect the communications they receive from your council, whether on your website or by email, to be safe, legitimate, accurate and trustworthy.

Unlike other domain names like .co.uk or .org, the .gov.uk domain is only available to UK public sector organisations and is strictly controlled. Any visitor to your website or recipient of your email will know they are engaging with an official part of the government. Your communications are immediately recognised as legitimate, and recipients will always understand the capacity in which they are being contacted.

Owning a .gov.uk domain is a sign of good practice. It clearly shows a council's commitment to professionalism. Your community can see that your council is a key, recognisable part of the government, and this automatically builds trust and legitimacy.

#### **Administration**

Having administrative control over email accounts will make life easier for clerks. For example, managing joiners and leavers can all be done centrally. This is particularly useful when someone leaves the council - their email account can be closed and information in it can be retained by the council. If that individual was using a personal email address, future recipients might mistakenly think they are still being contacted by a council member.

Time consuming tasks like Freedom of Information or Subject Access requests can also be managed more efficiently. Required information will be easy to access, and

councillors and clerks won't need to worry about providing information from their personal accounts. These tasks are handled centrally, not individually.

Another benefit, although relatively minor, offers peace of mind. When renewing a domain, it's common to do so every 1 or 2 years. If you let go, or forget to renew, a .co.uk or .org domain, it can be sold to someone else. This will never happen with a .gov.uk domain - a name will only be issued once and will not be sold on.

#### **Cyber security**

There are 2 important ways that .gov.uk domains are more secure than .org.uk or other domains.

- 1. All companies that set up .gov.uk domains must meet strict security criteria. This includes measures like Cyber Essentials which ensure they are well protected. If they are secure, your information is secure too.
- 2. There are also security criteria for the services they set up for you. For example, validation systems will protect your council's email domain from being used for spoofing and phishing scams. These systems also ensure that your emails cannot be altered while being sent or received.

The second way your .gov.uk domain is protected is through central government: There are teams whose job it is to scan .gov.uk domains for threats and vulnerabilities. This includes our team in the Cabinet Office, who look for security weaknesses, and the National Cyber Security Centre, which monitors your websites and email services for suspicious activity.

These protections are crucial for your council and your community. While we can't always prevent human error, these measures will make you less vulnerable to data breaches, phishing attacks, and loss of trust and reputation.

## **Getting your council agreement**

#### Discussion points for your parish council

If your council is not yet ready to decide on moving to a .gov.uk domain, consider these questions to start conversations. They can help broaden your council's thinking about your website, digital communications, and engagement with your community, partners, and suppliers. Doing some research to gather answers ahead of time might also help in your discussions.

#### Ease of use and access

 How easy is it for everyone in your community, including those with disabilities, to use your website and emails?

#### Website

- How easy is it to use your parish council's website?
- Can residents with disabilities access it?
- Does it have the latest information?
- How many people visit your parish council website daily/weekly/monthly?
- Is it user-friendly on a mobile device?

#### **Digital communication**

- How does your parish council use email, newsletters, and blogs to communicate with your community, suppliers, and partners?
- Are these communications regular?
- Is the content accessible?
- Who is reading them your community, suppliers, partners, others?

#### **Feedback**

- How do you receive communications and feedback from your community, suppliers, and partners?
- How quickly do you reply to their questions?
- How do you handle their feedback or complaints?

#### Safety and privacy

 How do you keep your data safe and respect the privacy of your community, suppliers, and partners, especially regarding sensitive information?  Are you effectively following your responsibilities under the Data Protection Act 2018?

#### Search engine visibility

 How does your parish council show up in online searches, such as Google? How easy is it to find?

#### Managing your council meetings

Your council will need to discuss moving to a .gov.uk domain at your parish council meetings. The following suggestions have been provided by the Society for Local Council Clerks (SLCC) for you to use at your council meetings.

#### Agenda

- 1. Parish council domain
  - 1.a. Parish council domain name to consider a proposal to change to a gov.uk domain name, to agree the name of the new domain and to continue to own the current domain
  - 1.b. .gov.uk Approved Registrar to consider appointing a .gov.uk Approved Registrar to register the new domain name and provide support
  - 1.c. Website provider to review the current provision of the website hosting and consider a quotation to convert the current website to .gov.uk
  - 1.d. Emails to review who will have .gov.uk email addresses

#### **Minutes**

- 1.a. The Council considered the proposal and RESOLVED to agree to change to a .gov.uk domain name. The Council RESOLVED to agree to order the name xxx-pc.gov.uk
- 1.b. The Council RESOLVED to agree to appoint xxx as the Domain Registrar
- 1.c. The Council RESOLVED to agree to continue with the current website supplier and host at a cost of £x and to agree to the quotation of £xx for the conversion of the website to gov.uk
- 1.d. The Council RESOLVED to agree to provide xxx with .gov.uk email addresses

## What services does your council need?

When moving to a .gov.uk domain, your parish council may want to purchase the domain, a website, and as many email accounts as needed. However, we understand that budget constraints may be a concern. Here are some guidelines to help your parish council decide on the services it requires.

#### .gov.uk domain

The absolute minimum requirement when moving over to a .gov.uk domain, is buying the domain itself. You need to buy this from a .gov.uk Approved Registrar. Other services - such as email and website - are all connected to your domain.

#### Websites

Whether you already have a website or not, there are different levels of support available from your .gov.uk Approved Registrar:

#### **Current website diversion**

If you are happy with your current website provider, inform your .gov.uk Approved Registrar. They will work with your provider to divert your website to the new .gov.uk domain. This may incur a one-time cost.

#### Hosting

Your .gov.uk Approved Registrar can host your website and also provide space to store its content and management tools - for example, using WordPress. There is usually an ongoing cost for this service.

#### **Design and Management**

You can opt for your .gov.uk Approved Registrar to design, build, and continuously manage and update your website's content and layout. Costs and quality of service can vary significantly in this area. You can expect to pay a one off design and build cost, as well as ongoing management costs.

#### **Emails**

At a minimum, your council should have one centrally managed and owned email address. Ideally, this will be a .gov.uk address. As the clerk, you will be able to manage

these emails – including tasks like freezing accounts, changing passwords, and setting up or removing old accounts - centrally.

Approved Registrars offer various options for email services:

#### Webmail

Some registrars provide email accounts with a webmail inbox, accessible through a web browser on your computer. These emails can also be read on desktops, phones or tablets via your application of choice. For example, Outlook, Thunderbird, Apple Mail, Gmail.

#### **Emails as part of cloud services**

Many registrars include email packages as part of wider cloud services, such as those from Microsoft or Google. Users can access their emails via webmail or download applications on their computers, phones, and tablets.

#### **Email migration**

It is possible to migrate your old messages to your new domain. It may incur an upfront cost.

#### **Other Services**

Your council may want to consider other services such as cloud storage for documents or programmes for word processing or spreadsheets. These all come as additional costs.

#### In summary

- Carefully research the services you and your colleagues need for council business - choose those that are essential and within your budget
- Choose a .gov.uk Approved Registrar that you are confident will provide good service and provide the support you need
- Seek recommendations from other parish councils or through forums such as the Facebook Community Clerks Network. They can be very helpful in making the right choice

# Setting your budget and available funding

Estimating the cost of moving to a .gov.uk domain can be challenging as it varies based on your individual parish council's needs. For instance, a council requiring a domain, new website, emails, full data migration, and data storage will incur higher costs than one that only needs the domain and emails.

#### Financial support from the Parish Council Domains Helper Service

The Parish Council Domains Helper Service has allocated funding for FY 2024/25 to assist 1000 councils moving to a .gov.uk domain. These councils will receive a discount of £100 +VAT. This funding must be used to cover the cost of setting up a .gov.uk domain or, for councils that already have a domain, to purchase .gov.uk email addresses.

This funding is **only** available through the .gov.uk Approved Registrars that are part of the Parish Council Domains Helper Service. It is available on a first-come-first-served, once per council basis.

#### Reduced wholesale costs

The Cabinet Office has reduced the wholesale cost of a .gov.uk domain from £100+VAT for the first two years to £10+VAT per year. The wholesale cost is the price that .gov.uk Approved Registrars pay before applying any mark-up. While we cannot predict exactly how this will affect the final cost for councils, we hope it will lead to lower prices over time.

## Timing your move

It might be tempting to delay your move to a .gov.uk domain to see if costs will decrease. However, because funding is limited and the market response is uncertain, we recommend proceeding with your move now. Potential savings from reduced wholesale costs will still benefit you in future renewals.

## **Budget considerations**

By understanding the services you need, planning your budget accordingly and taking advantage of available financial support, your parish council can make a smooth and cost-effective move to a .gov.uk domain.

# Choosing your parish council domain name

When selecting a .gov.uk domain name for your parish council, it is essential to ensure the name is clear and instantly recognisable. The name should be easy to understand and not too long or complex for your council, community, suppliers, or partners to use.

Your chosen .gov.uk Approved Registrar can assist you in choosing a name that meets all the .gov.uk naming criteria. Here are some guidelines to follow:

#### Use your council's full name (or a suitable short form)

You must use the full name of your parish council or a suitable short form. For example,

- caversfieldparishcouncil.gov.uk
- caversfield-pc.gov.uk
- caversfieldparish.gov.uk

#### **Domain availability**

If the domain you want is already taken by another parish council or it is a common name across England, you will need to include a geographic identifier. For example, if caversfieldparish.gov.uk is taken, you could use:

- caversfieldparishnorth.gov.uk
- caversfieldparishsouth.gov.uk
- Any other identifier that makes sense to your community

### **Acronyms**

If you apply for a domain name with an acronym, it must be clear, descriptive, and unique to avoid confusion. It is encouraged to include 'parishcouncil' or '-pc' at the end of the domain name.

#### **Additional Information**

Visit the GOV.UK guidance for more information on <u>choosing an appropriate .gov.uk</u> <u>domain</u>.

By following these guidelines, your parish council will have a .gov.uk domain name that effectively represents your council and is easily recognisable to all your stakeholders.

# **Choosing a registrant**

The registrant (formerly known as the domain name administrator) is the person responsible for your .gov.uk domain. This role is about ensuring any changes to the .gov.uk domain name and website are properly managed and approved.

#### Role of the clerk as the registrant

For parish councils a permanent employee, typically the clerk, must hold the role of registrant. This means that the clerk will have control over the domain name and all related services, such as emails and the website. As the registrant, the clerk will work with their .gov.uk Approved Registrar and be responsible for:

- Managing domain changes overseeing and approving any modifications to the domain name
- Control of services managing the services, including email accounts and the website
- Ensuring compliance making sure the domain and its use comply with relevant guidelines and policies

By appointing a registrant, your parish council ensures that domain management is in capable hands, and has a central point of responsibility and control.

# **Accessibility**

It is important to mention your council's statutory accessibility commitments: Every council, regardless of the domain it uses, has a <u>legal obligation</u> to ensure its website, and the information on it, is accessible to the whole community.

#### What does this mean?

Ideally, your website and all of its content should be accessible for everyone regardless of any visual, hearing, cognitive, motor impairments or learning difficulties they may have.

It is rare to find any website that is 100% accessible, and small councils - where there is little budget available for a redesign - may find this particularly difficult.

#### What if your council cannot afford a fully accessible website?

Your council can set aside their accessibility obligation if you can show that making all the necessary changes would be a financial 'disproportionate burden'. In other words, if you can prove your council cannot afford to make the changes required to make its website accessible, you do not have to.

However, it is important for every council to demonstrate that it is committed to accessibility. At a minimum, you must include an accessibility statement on your website. This statement should include contact details for people to raise any concerns about your website's accessibility. It should also include links (if possible) to an accessible version of any published information - for example, a PDF document is not accessible for all screen readers so providing a link to a Word document would be helpful.

## Check your council's website for accessibility

A website is an important communication tool for all councils, reaching out to everyone in their community. You can complete your own <u>basic accessibility check</u> to see where improvements can be made on your council's website. Councils are also encouraged to read the guidance on GOV.UK on how to <u>make your website accessible</u> and <u>publish an accessibility statement.</u>

# Selecting a .gov.uk Approved Registrar

# What to expect from our .gov.uk Approved Registrar shortlist

When you choose one of the participating .gov.uk Approved Registrars from our <u>shortlist</u>, you can expect the following additional support:

#### 1. Active, accessible support

The 36 shortlisted .gov.uk Approved Registrars will provide active support during your transition to a .gov.uk domain. They will communicate in clear, non-technical language and take the initiative to assist you and your councillors throughout the process.

#### 2. Service set-up & migration

Whether working directly with your council or a third party supplier, a .gov.uk Approved Registrar will help set up your required services - for example, domain, email and website, and migrate your data if required.

#### 3. Support device set-up

They will offer advice and direct support to set up new email accounts, move data to the new domain, and manage email forwarding.

#### 4. Technical point of contact

Your chosen .gov.uk Approved Registrar will act as the technical point of contact, addressing any issues that arise with your .gov.uk domain and resolving them promptly.

#### 5. Telephone support

All participating .gov.uk Approved Registrars will provide a contact number for telephone support if required.

#### 6. Ensure continuity of service

A .gov.uk Approved Registrars will work to minimise any disruption to your existing domain during the move to a .gov.uk domain.

#### 7. Ensure compliance with the Practitioner's Guide

A .gov.uk Approved Registrar will provide ongoing guidance on best cyber security practices to ensure your council complies with the <u>2024 JPAG</u> <u>Practitioners Guide</u>.

#### 8. Manage Cabinet Office invoices

Your chosen .gov.uk Approved Registrar will manage the £100+VAT funding for parish councils who move to a .gov.uk domain. They will directly apply the £100+VAT as a reduction to your council's total costs. They will then recover the cost, in the form of an invoice, to the Cabinet Office.

# Tips for selecting the right .gov.uk Approved Registrar for your council's needs and budget

#### 1. Review the shortlist

Look through the <u>shortlist of .gov.uk Approved Registrars</u> to find one that suits your council's specific needs. The comparison table together with the company descriptions and services they offer should help guide your choice.

#### 2. Seek recommendations

We cannot recommend doing this enough! Ask a council with a .gov.uk domain about their .gov.uk Approved Registrar and if they are happy with how they managed the move and also about the support they provide.

#### 3. Get support from SLCC

Contact the SLCC helpline, even if you are not a member, or speak with Jane Olds, for additional support. You can also post on the parish council's FaceBook forum - Community Clerks Network - to get opinions from fellow clerks.

#### 4. Check more than just the cost

Don't focus solely on cost! Ensure that the .gov.uk Approved Registrars can actually provide the specific services, security, and support your council requires. If they can't, it is best that you find one that can.

#### 5. Look for value in bundles

Ask the .gov.uk Approved Registrars for service bundles that could offer good value for your council. But, make sure any bundle you consider includes only the services your council needs.

#### 6. Check costs with the Parish Council Domains Helper Service

If the quotes seem too high, email the Parish Council Domains Helper Service. We can help check if the costs are broken down sensibly and if the quote really suits your council's needs.

#### 7. Ask questions

- What help do they offer for websites and emails?
- Is the SSL (security) certificate an additional cost?

- O How do they handle problems?
- What backup plans do they have?
- O How are .gov.uk domain records managed and changed?
- How will they inform councils when changes are made?
- What advice do they provide on passwords and security?
- O How do they work with the Domains Team at the Cabinet Office?
- How do they comply with GDPR and other relevant data protection regulations?
- Will you set up our domain on NCSC's active web check, mail check and early warning services?

#### 8. Think about their communication and support

- O Do you like them?
- Are they communicating in a language you easily understand?
- Have they taken the time to reassure you and answer your questions?

# **Getting quotes**

For audit purposes, it is best practice to get three quotes before you select a .gov.uk Approved Registrar for your council. This table will help your council make an informed decision about which one to choose, and also gather any evidence you need for your next council audit.

# Here's what to do next

Once you have worked your way through, and completed, the checklist steps you need to contact your chosen .gov.uk Approved Registrar. They will apply for a .gov.uk domain name on your behalf. They will then send you an eligibility funding form to complete.

Your application will be checked to make sure that you really are who you say you are. As you are applying for a government domain, it is important to make sure that someone isn't trying to set up an unofficial .gov.uk domain for your council. Please note: this part of the process may take some time. We're sure you understand the importance of this step!

You may want to sign up for the next session with the Parish Council Domains Helper Service. It is an opportunity to ask any questions you may have about moving to a .gov.uk domain and to learn about how you can manage resistance to change.

It is therefore a great disappointment that a single member of the public in the parish continues to carry out a vexatious campaign of harassment and abuse against the Parish Council which costs the Parish Council a great deal of time, and the residents of Potto a great deal of money.

On a more positive note, I must thank all Councillors for their fantastic support and all the hard work that they have put in over the last year, A lot of the work of the Parish Council goes unnoticed yet is essential to the daily lives of everyone in the parish.

A great deal has been accomplished and this report will highlight some of the many activities that have taken place over the last 12 months.

#### **Jubilee Bench Project**

The Jubilee Bench project has changed to a Memorial project for Queen Elizabeth the II, following her death. The bench has become something of a landmark and provides a welcome resting place for the many users of the bridleway.

#### **Jubilee Tree Project**

Cllr Griffin organised for more than 40 trees to be donated from the Woodland Trust which have been grown on for planting around the parish. This has been followed up by another donation of more than 100 trees. Additionally new trees have been planted in the hedgerows around the parish to help improve the landscape and our local environment.

#### **Policing**

Security and Policing is a high priority for the parish council, and we are supported in this activity by North Yorkshire Police. We are extremely fortunate that crime levels in the parish are generally low, however we all need to remain diligent in our behaviours, supporting the efforts of the local police force.

#### **Planning**

#### A Plan for Potto

#### **Potto Stell System**

- New way marker signs.
- New dog litter bin

#### **Grass Cutting**

Potto Parish Council funds the cutting of the grass verges in the Parish, this is undertaken twice each year to maintain the roadsides in the Parish and improve safety.

#### Salt and Grit

The Parish Council funds the purchase and filling of the salt and grit bins in the Parish to assist residents during the cold weather, fortunately they have had little use in the last year.

#### Village Hall

The Village Hall committee under the Chairmanship of Liz Hepple are once again due our thanks and appreciation for their sterling work.

#### **Potto Website**

The Potto parish Council website <u>www.potto.org.uk</u> continues to provide a source of valuable information for all and is continuously being enhanced and new information added.

#### **Traffic Calming**

The parish council together with Crathorne, and Seamer parish councils continue to share the VAS speed sign which has reduced speeds through the village. The Parish Council are working towards a 20's Plenty Scheme for the village.

#### Potto Parish Council: audit of accounts for the year ended 31 March 2023

Dear

Thank you for your email and attached letter of objection dated 28 July 2023 in connection with Potto Parish Council (the Council). You have raised matters in respect of the 2022/23 Annual Governance and Accountability Return (AGAR).

We wrote to you on 29 November 2023 to inform you that seven of your eligible objections had been accepted for further consideration. We have written to the Council and received its formal response and all of the additional information that we requested, including a number of sensitive and confidential items. All documents material to our decisions on the accepted objections are in the public domain or have previously been shared with you, with the exception of copies of emails between the Council and North Yorkshire Council appertaining to Objection 9b, since they contain personal confidential information.

You have asked us to consider reporting on these matters in a public interest report; we have considered whether each accepted objection should be included in a public interest report.

Our decisions following consideration of the accepted objections under Step 3 of the National Audit Office's Auditor Guidance Note 04 are set out below:

**Objection 4:** You object to the response given to Assertion 3 of the 2022/23 AGAR, in respect of:

- m. Failure to respond to the objector in respect of advice received from the ICO; and
- p. Breaches of data protection legislation.

**Findings:** We note that these objections relate to the response given in Assertion 3 of the Annual Governance Statement.

Objective 4m:

You contend that the Council has ignored advice and failed to carry out actions requested by the Information Commissioner's Office (ICO) during 2022/23.

We note that the ICO issued a decision notice (IC-157306-S8Z9) on 15 August 2022 in which the Information Commissioner found that the Council had failed to conduct adequate searches for requested information. He directed a fresh response to the information requester following the conduct of further searches.

The Council made an appeal on 17 August 2022 against this judgment; however, that appeal was struck out by the First-Tier Tribunal (General Regulatory Chamber - Information Rights) on 23 December 2022 (details in this link).

We understand that the Council has yet to comply with the original decision notice and note that the Council's minutes during 2022/23 do not record the fact that the appeal was struck out.

In our view, as a result of these findings, the Council should have responded 'No' to Assertion 3 on the 2022/23 AGAR; notwithstanding the fact that complaints against the Council to the ICO in 3 other cases during 2022/23 were not upheld by the Information Commissioner.

We further note that in respect of the financial year 2023/24, although most cases were not upheld by the Information Commissioner, elements of one case were upheld. The Council should ensure that it considers this when responding to Assertion 3 of the 2023/24 AGAR.

#### Objective 4p:

You also contend that in September 2022, the Council released your personal details to the local and national press and when you raised this with the Council via email, your correspondence received no reply. Having reviewed a number of press articles that you provided excerpts from, including the following articles (dated 8 and 13 September 2022 respectively): Moaner who sent council 366 complaints triggers external audit costing every house in village £500 | Daily Mail Online and Potto council hit out at 'obsessive mindset' of anonymous complainer who triggered £37k audit - Teesside Live (gazettelive.co.uk), we can see that the Council's statements within the articles do not include any of your details; but in some articles you and/or the Chair have been quoted commenting on the issues and in some articles ICO decisions have been quoted which include your name. We have not seen any evidence to indicate that breaches of data protection legislation have been made by the Council in relation to these articles.

**Conclusion:** We uphold Objection 4m and are minded to raise reporting matters in our external auditor report on the 2022/23 AGAR in respect of the issues relating to this objection.

We do not uphold Objection 4p.

**Objection 7e:** You object to the Council's response given in Assertion 6 of the Annual Governance Statement, in relation to the process for the appointment of the internal auditor.

**Findings:** This objection relates to the response given in Assertion 6 of the Annual Governance Statement.

We note that the mandatory requirements of Assertion 6 as prescribed by the 'JPAG Practitioners' Guide 2023' are as follows:

- "1.35 Internal audit The authority needs to undertake an effective internal audit to evaluate the effectiveness of its risk management, control and governance processes considering internal auditing guidance for smaller authorities.
- 1.36 Provision of information The authority needs to ensure it has taken all necessary steps to facilitate the work of those conducting the internal audit, including making available all relevant documents and records and supplying any information or explanations required.
- 1.37 Non-statutory guidance on internal audit can be found in Section 4."



It is a statutory requirement of the Accounts and Audit Regulations 2015 that all smaller authorities, including local councils, 'undertake an effective internal audit to evaluate the effectiveness of its risk management, control and governance processes, taking into account public sector internal auditing standards or guidance'. This guidance is found in Section 4 of the 'JPAG Practitioners' Guide 2023' and includes the following information in respect of the appointment of an internal auditor:

#### "Selecting and appointing an internal audit provider

4.6. In addition to ensuring the appointed internal auditor has relevant knowledge of the public sector, there are two key principles an authority must follow in appointing an internal audit provider: independence and competence.

. . .

#### Engagement

- 4.13. Every authority should ensure that they have a letter of engagement which would normally include:
- roles and responsibilities
- audit planning and timing of visits
- reporting requirements
- rights to access to information, members and officers
- period of engagement
- remuneration
- any other matters required for the management of the engagement by the authority
- 4.14. Most internal auditors will have professional indemnity insurance cover which provides both the authority and the person or firm engaged, with protection and assurance.

#### Planning and oversight

- 4.15. It is a matter for the authority to determine how best to meet the statutory requirement for internal audit, having regard to its size, scope of services and complexity of financial arrangements.
- 4.16. Authorities should, at least annually, carry out a review of the effectiveness of their overall internal audit arrangements. It should be designed to provide sufficient assurance for the authority that standards are being met and that the work of internal audit is effective. Authorities should judge the extent and scope of the review by reference to their own individual circumstances.
- 4.17. As with any review, it should be evidence based. Wherever possible this should be gathered throughout the year. Sources may include:
- previous review and action plan
- annual report by internal audit
- other reports from internal audit, including internal audit plan, monitoring reports, and the results of any investigations
- any reports by the external auditor
- the results of any other external reviews of internal control
- 4.18. As part of the review the internal auditor should produce a report to the authority highlighting areas for improvement or development. An action plan should be produced setting out the areas of improvement required, any proposed remedial actions, the



members or officers responsible for delivering improvement, and the deadlines for completion of the actions."

We requested (and have reviewed where provided) the following documents which support a 'Yes' response to Assertion 6:

- a. The letter of engagement and agreed scope of internal audit work for 2022/23;
- b. Copies of the minutes agreeing the appointment of the internal auditor for 2022/23; and
- c. Copies of the minutes and supporting paper documenting the Council's annual review of the effectiveness of the internal audit provision during 2022/23.

We note that the letter of engagement was dated, signed by all parties and approved by full Council on 15 March 2023. It was drawn up by the Council and not the internal auditor, which is unusual, but it exists as evidence of the terms of engagement and scope of the work.

The Council did not provide us with copies of the minutes and supporting paper documenting the Council's annual review of the effectiveness of the internal audit provision during 2022/23 and we have not found reference to any such review in the minutes on the Council's website.

**Conclusion:** We partially uphold this objection and are minded to raise a reporting matter in our external auditor report on the 2022/23 AGAR in respect of the importance of an annual review of effectiveness of the internal audit provision. In our view, the Council was correct in responding 'Yes' to Assertion 6 on the 2022/23 AGAR.

**Objection 9b:** You object to the Council's response given in Assertion 8 of the Annual Governance Statement, in relation to the Council's failure to follow due process regarding the co-option of a member during 2021/22.

**Findings:** In our view, this objection relates to the response given in Assertion 3 of the Annual Governance Statement and not Assertion 8 as is your contention. We were minded to investigate the impact of this on the Assertion 3 response on the 2022/23 AGAR, although we note that most of the circumstances surrounding this matter occurred in an earlier year.

We note that North Yorkshire Council previously carried out an investigation into whether a casual vacancy had been triggered during 2021/22 when a co-opted councillor did not sign a declaration of office at the meeting following the co-option. North Yorkshire Council concluded that the co-opted councillor had been excused by the Parish Council from signing a declaration of office until a later meeting; therefore a casual vacancy had not been triggered. We note the Council's failure to make an appropriate resolution regarding the permission to make a declaration at a later meeting; however, since this all occurred during 2021/22, it does not impact on the 2022/23 AGAR.

During our work on this objection, we found that North Yorkshire Council has only published the registers of interest for two of the parish councillors (dated May 2023) and the Parish Council website only includes links to those. (We understand that NYC lost the forms hand delivered to them in April 2022, although the Parish Council has copies of some of these.) It is a statutory requirement for the Parish Council website to include copies of all councillors' registers of interests (and not links to another website).

**Conclusion:** We do not uphold this objection; however, we are minded to raise a reporting matter regarding the Council's failure to publish members' registers of interests. In our view, Assertion 3 should have been answered 'No' as a result of this breach of section 29(7) of the Localism Act 2011. The Council should ensure that it considers this when responding to Assertion 3 of the 2023/24 AGAR.



**Objection 10:** You object to the response given to Assertion 9 of the 2022/23 AGAR, in respect of:

- a. Trustee status:
- b. Charity Commission records; and
- c. Asset register.

**Findings:** These objections relate to the response given in Assertion 9 of the Annual Governance Statement.

We note the information provided to us in support of your objection, namely copies of the following documents:

- 6 July, 26 July & 1 August 1983 correspondence between Chair of Council and the National Association of Local Council (NALC) via the Yorkshire & Cleveland Local Councils' Association regarding advice on changing from a number of individual trustees to the Council as a body corporate becoming the sole trustee;
- 12 February 1987 excerpt from a schedule of documents to be deposited at Barclays Bank by the Council's solicitor;
- 10 August 1989 various excerpts from a conveyance and trust deed relating to purchase of land by the Council;

#### Objection 10a:

As part of our additional work, we requested copies from the Council of any advice received in relation to the documentary evidence provided by you in relation to the Council's trustee status in respect of the village hall. No response to this request was provided by the Council.

The Council has informed us that recently the search for the original deeds to the Village Hall in conjunction with Barclays Bank and solicitors has concluded that the deeds were lost by the bank, where they had been stored. The Council has stated that, based on the Land Registry data, the Council assumes that it owns the Village Hall.

We note that the NALC advice dated 26 July 1983 states that "the Parish Council, if it is willing, can be appointed custodian trustee by the existing trustees (see Trustee Act 1906 s4 and in particular s.4(3))."

We note that one excerpt from the conveyance and trust deed dated 10 August 1989 refers to the Council as "Trustee of the Potto Village Hall a charity registered under the Charities Act 1964" and other excerpts refer to the Council as "trustee"; a further excerpt states "...shall apply to the said Council and to the Management Committee of the said Village Hall respectively in like manner as they apply to the Public Trustee and Managing Trustees."

As this 1989 document appears to be the latest deed document that exists, we have reviewed its wording and referred to s46 of the Charities Act 1960 and s4(2) of the Public Trustee Act 1906 in order to reach our conclusions in respect of the 2022/23 AGAR.

In our view, it is clear from the August 1989 document that the Council as public trustee became custodian trustee and the management committee became managing trustees. In many places, the various documents that you have found simply refer to the term 'trustee' when describing the Council; however, where they are specific, they specify that the Council is the custodian trustee of the Village Hall and the Village Hall Management Committee are the managing trustees.

We note that the Council has responded 'N/A' to Assertion 9 of the Annual Governance Statement, which is the correct response as it is not the sole managing trustee. The Council has however left Boxes 11a and 11b of the Accounting Statements blank. It should have responded 'No' and 'N/A' respectively. We are minded to raise this as a reporting matter in our external auditor report on the 2022/23 AGAR.

#### Objection 10b:

We note your concerns regarding the Charity Commission records; however, given our conclusion in respect of Objection 10a, since the Management Committee is a separate body, it is not within our remit to investigate this further.

For completeness, we have pointed out the differences between the trustees listed on the Charity Commission website and the members of the Management Committee listed on the Village Hall website to the Chair of the Council, who is also a managing trustee.

#### Objection 10c:

As the custodian trustee for the Village Hall, the Council's asset register should include the Village Hall as a charity asset held by the authority as trustee at a nil value, i.e. with the value excluded from the total of the Council's assets as shown in Box 9 of the AGAR.

We have reviewed the Council's asset registers as at 31 March 2022 and 31 March 2023 and found that the Village Hall was not included on either of them. The Council must ensure that the Village Hall is included in its asset register at nil value, since it is the custodian trustee.

The Council's 2022/23 AGAR shows that the Box 9 figures for 2022/23 and the prior year correctly exclude any value for the Village Hall; however, the Box 9 figure for 2022/23 incorrectly excludes an asset listed on the asset register as 'Queen Elizabeth II Memorial Project' valued at £3,500.

**Conclusion:** We partially uphold Objection 10a and are minded to raise a reporting matter in our external auditor report on the 2022/23 AGAR in respect of this matter.

We do not uphold Objection 10b.

We uphold Objection 10c and are minded to raise reporting matters in our external auditor report on the 2022/23 AGAR in respect of these matters.

Having considered whether each accepted objection should be included in a public interest report, we have decided not to take this course of action. Please note that there is no right of appeal against a decision not to issue a public interest report in respect of any of the objections.

At this stage, we would like to remind both you and the Council of the need to ensure compliance with relevant data protection legislation (including GDPR). This could include, for example, redacting personal information (such as the objector's name, address or other identifying information) from any subsequent publication or sharing of the objections and related correspondence.

#### Regulation

The Accounts and Audit Regulations 2015 require smaller authorities, each financial year, to conduct a review of the effectiveness of the system of internal control and prepare an annual governance statement in accordance with proper practices in relation to accounts. The internal audit report should therefore be made available to all members to support and inform them when they are considering the parish council's approval of the annual governance statement.

#### **Independence & Competence**

The internal audit was conducted by Graeme Boagey, FCA of Chipchase Manners, Chartered Accountants. We confirm we are independent from the management of the financial controls and procedures of the parish council and that the internal auditor has no conflicts of interest with the parish council, nor do they provide any management or financial assistance to the parish council.

The internal auditor is a qualified practicing accountant with over 35 years' experience as a registered statutory auditor.

#### **Engagement Letter**

An engagement letter was issued on 25 April 2024 covering the 2023/24 internal audit assignment.

#### Planning & Inherent Risk Assessment

Our work will address each of the internal control objectives as stated on the Annual Internal Audit Report of the AGAR.

Testing will be carried out on a sample of data to encompass the period of the parish council year under review.

#### A. BOOKS OF ACCOUNT

#### Internal audit requirement

Appropriate accounting records have been properly kept throughout the financial year.

The parish council maintains its financial records using Excel. Given the size of the parish council, and the small number of transactions in the year, the use of Excel is an appropriate and cost-effective method of maintaining the parish council's financial records.

We make no recommendation for changes in this system.

We tested opening balances as at 1/4/23 and confirmed they could be agreed back to the accounts for 2022/23.

#### **Section Conclusion**

The control assertion of "Appropriate accounting records have been properly kept throughout the financial year" has been met.

#### B. FINANCIAL REGULATIONS, GOVERNANCE & PAYMENTS

#### Internal audit requirement

This authority complied with its financial regulations, payments were supported by invoices, all expenditure was approved and VAT was appropriately accounted for.

The parish council's financial regulations are set out in a document dated February 2023 which is available on the website of the parish council.

The regulations contain provisions for the approval of spending, setting of budgets, reconciliation of the bank and reporting to council.

Minutes are uploaded to the council website on a timely basis.

The minutes show authorisation of payments lists in accordance with the parish council's regulations.

<u>All</u> payments for services / goods in 2023/24 have been supported by invoices, no sampling was required in this instance given the small number of payments made in the 2023/24 year.

Costs are recorded inclusive of VAT and no input VAT has been recovered in 2023/24. Input VAT is recovered periodically.

Cheques must be signed by two signatories.

#### **Section Conclusion**

The control assertion "This authority complied with its financial regulations, payments were supported by invoices, all expenditure was approved and VAT was appropriately accounted for", has been met.



#### C. RISK MANAGEMENT & INSURANCE

#### Internal audit requirement

This authority assessed the significant risks to achieving its objectives and reviewed the adequacy of arrangements to manage these.

The parish council undertakes a risk assessment that covers operational and financial risks, the parish council's risk management strategy is set out in a document dated February 2023 which is available on the parish council's website.

The parish council reviews its insurance requirements as part of the renewal process.

#### **Section Conclusion**

The control objective of "This authority assessed the significant risks to achieving its objectives and reviewed the adequacy of arrangements to manage these.", has been met

#### D. BUDGET, PRECEPT & RESERVES

#### Internal audit requirement

The precept or rates requirement resulted from an adequate budgetary process; progress against the budget was regularly monitored; and reserves were appropriate.

The minutes contain evidence of budget reporting.

The reserves held at 31 March 2024 appear adequate for a parish council of this size.

#### **Section Conclusion**

The control objective of "The precept or rates requirement resulted from an adequate budgetary process; progress against the budget was regularly monitored; and reserves were appropriate.", has been met.

#### E. INCOME

#### Internal audit requirement

Expected income was fully received, based on correct prices, properly recorded and promptly banked; and VAT was appropriately accounted for.

The parish council has precept, grant and interest income.

The precept income, received in two instalments throughout the year, has been checked against remittance advices from North Yorkshire Council.

The council does not have any debtors

#### **Section Conclusion**

The control objective of "Expected income was fully received, based on correct prices, properly recorded and promptly banked; and VAT was appropriately accounted for.", has been met.



#### F. PETTY CASH

#### Internal audit requirement

Petty cash payments were properly supported by receipts, all petty cash expenditure was approved and VAT appropriately accounted for.

There has been no petty cash expenditure in 2023/24. The year end cash balance of £9.07 is held by the Clerk.

#### **Section Conclusion**

The control objective of "Petty cash payments were properly supported by receipts, all petty cash expenditure was approved and VAT accounted for" has effectively been met.

#### G. PAYROLL

#### Internal audit requirement

Salaries to employees and allowances to members were paid in accordance with this authority's approvals, and PAYE and NI requirements were properly applied.

The parish council has only one part-time employee being the Clerk.

PAYE has not been operated by the parish council against salaries paid during 2023/24, this is not in accordance with PAYE regulations set out by HMRC.

#### **Section Conclusion**

The parish council has <u>not</u> met its obligations with respect to operating a PAYE scheme. A PAYE scheme has now been established and will be operated for 2024/25 and future tax years..

#### H. ASSETS AND INVESTMENTS

#### Internal audit requirement

Asset and investments registers were complete and accurate and properly maintained.

The Council has a simple fixed asset register in place, the Village Hall is recorded at nil cost in the absence of any historical cost information.

#### **Section Conclusion**

The control objective of "Asset and investments registers were complete and accurate and properly maintained" has been met.

#### I. BANK & CASH

#### Internal audit requirement

Periodic and year-end bank account reconciliations were properly carried out.

At the year-end date the parish council had a reconciled bank position.



There is evidence in the minutes of regular bank reconciliations being prepared and presented to council for review.

#### **Section Conclusion**

We are of the opinion that bank and cash balances are properly shown on the AGAR and that the control objective of "Periodic and year-end bank account reconciliations were properly carried out" has been met.

#### J. YEAR END ACCOUNTS

#### Internal audit requirement

Accounting statements prepared during the year were prepared on the correct accounting basis (receipts and payments or income and expenditure), agreed to the cash book, supported by an adequate audit trail from underlying records and where appropriate debtors and creditors were properly recorded.

The year-end accounts have been correctly prepared on the receipts & payments basis with no requirement for a box 7 & 8 reconciliation.

The AGAR correctly casts and cross casts and the comparatives have been correctly copied over from the 2022-23 AGAR.

The parish council had made provision within its schedule of meetings to sign off the annual governance statement.

#### **Section Conclusion**

The control objective of "Accounting statements prepared during the year were prepared on the correct accounting basis (receipts and payments or income and expenditure), agreed to the cash book, supported by an adequate audit trail from underlying records and where appropriate debtors and creditors were properly recorded" has been met.

#### 3) Residents urged to check they are registered to vote

Residents across North Yorkshire are being reminded to check they are registered to vote at their address so that everyone who has the right to take part in upcoming elections can have their say on decisions that affect them. Like all UK local authorities, every year North Yorkshire Council's elections team is required by law to confirm whether the details held on the electoral register are correct. This is known as the annual canvass. Anyone concerned

about the risk of scams should be reassured that the council will never ask for bank details as part of the annual canvass. There are also examples of the forms online, so people know what questions to expect.
